#### Welcoming New Area Residents

In Spring 2023 I responded to a request for a volunteer needed to help a young Syrian refugee mother with English conversation. I thought to myself that I could certainly help with that! Little did I realize at the time how much I would learn about the Syrian culture, this family's values and love of family and their Muslim faith. As the early months passed as a volunteer, I offered my help in other needed ways to assist this young mother and her family. It turned out to be a very gratifying experience.

Maine Multicultural Center (MMCC) is one the Bangor area non-profit organizations that helps coordinate newly arriving refugees, both individuals and families, start a new life in Maine, In this family's case, they fled war in Syria and lived in a refugee camp in Jordan. This young family was thoroughly vetted, processed and approved by the U.S. State Department and settled in Maine. Through a U.S. State Department contract, rental housing was arranged by Catholic Charities just days before the family's arrival at the Bangor airport: husband, wife, and six wonderful children ages approximately 6–13, three boys and three girls. MMCC moved in donated furnishings to get the family set up with basic needs, complete with a first dinner meal awaiting them on arrival from the airport and beds made and ready. This is all completed by volunteers.

A small team of 4–5 volunteers from MMCC was assigned to this family to help them get established in their new country and community. I was on this small team. My role started assisting the young mother with English conversation. On our first introduction and "conversation" we relied on a smart phone translator (Syrian to English and English to Syrian) to converse. The young mother was eager to learn and improved steadily. She also attended practical, useful English lessons at the Bangor Public Library offered to these new individuals and families. Learning practical English skills and English conversation is vital to assimilating to their new community, neighbors, teachers, medical and dental staff, job interviews and shopping, and making new friends.

Over the full year I volunteered with this family, I was able to help this mother with weekly rides to the food pantry and Walmart for this family of eight, help complete various forms and money orders, locate almost–new shoe donations for the children's first day of school that Fall, cheer the father on for his Maine learner's permit to drive and later his driver's license test, and take the children to some of their dental appointments. Through our committed team volunteers, within that year the father secured good employment including on the job training leading to career advancement in the construction industry. The mother was successful in a seasonal part–time job while the children were in school with the owner asking if she would return for the following season. Both father and now mother were licensed to drive and driving themselves and their children in their own used car. Their six children loved school, their teachers and their new friends and missed their friends during summer vacation. I found this family smart, eager and hard working to be self–supporting. This family was on its way pursuing their American dream over time and for their children's futures. My volunteer job was done.

My volunteer time with this family and MMCC ended late this Spring. It was a gratifying experience to help this lovely young family in some small ways find their footing. It is important that they having American friends, so I will continue to visit with them periodically and watch them all grow and hopefully prosper, eventually with a home of their own which is their dream.

MMCC in Bangor is always in need of volunteers to help in many different ways on these small volunteer teams.
